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# December 2013 Meeting Ten Commandments The Fourth Commandment

#### **Opening** Prayer

Lord teach us to pray: Our Father...

#### The Reading (to be read by the Leader) "Honor Your Father and Your Mother"

To whom does the Fourth Commandment refer and what are the expectations of the word honor? Well, even Jesus asked the question; "Who is my Mother ... (Mt. 12, 48)" Of course Jesus defines the parameters of the answer to this question. "Whoever does the will of my heavenly Father is my brother and sister and Mother, (Mt. 12, 50). A broad stroke but accurate response, meaning that all of us are created in His image and likeness and therefore we are brothers and sisters in Christ. To live up to this identity we must discern and then obey the Lord's will for us in our lives. Some facets of our Father will do not require discernment; rather they simply require our attentiveness. The Fourth Commandment refers in the first place to one's physical parents, but also to the people to whom we owe our life, our well-being, our security and our faith. (Youcat 367)."

# The Reflection

# (to be read by the leader)

Our parents, through the grace of God gave us life itself, as the fruit of the love they have for one another. In other words, just as all of creation and particularly all of humanity is the fruit of the love expressed within the Blessed Trinity for one another, the extension of this is that we are expressions of love. It follows that naturally we must be that love for one another particularly to those responsible for the gift of life we have received from them. Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI wrote this about our families. "The family is the necessary good for peoples, an indispensable foundation for society and a great and lifelong treasure for couples. It is a unique good for children, who are meant to be the fruit of the love, of the total and generous self-giving of their parents, (July 2006)."

Brothers, the family is the cornerstone of our society, it is the single-most important component of this world we live in, short of the Creator Himself. It makes sense that we give appropriate dignity and respect to our parents who have blessed us in a very large way with who we have become. The extension is this; given that we are all part of the body of Christ, then all people need to be treated with dignity and respect. It is a logical conclusion that those who gave us life, who formed us, cared for us and gave selflessly of themselves on our behalf, should be the primary recipients of the respect, honor and love that for the most part we learned from them. Sixteen hundred years ago, St. Augustine of Hippo said; "The life of the parents is the book which the children read." Generally speaking, we can say that who we are as adults ourselves is in large part the gift and the result of our parents giving totally of themselves for our well-being and benefit.

How are we to honor our father and mother? Simply put, by reciprocating the love and the gratitude that we received so freely from them. If we are not able, or do not find it necessary to honor our parents, how are we to be an expression of love for those who are far less important to us in our lives. In other words, if we are unable to cultivate healthy loving relationships with our parents who loved us first, how do we expect to maintain healthy loving relationships with others? Make no mistake; parents are not perfect, neither are we. But for the most part we can say that they are acting out of love, and if love is their motivation, then they are doing the best they are humanly able to be Christ-like for us. Honor your father and mother, and there is a reasonable opportunity that the other relationships in your life will have a good chance to be loving and healthy.
